

TWELVE REASONS WHY A COST/BENEFIT ANALYSIS ON THE BITLESS BRIDLE SHOWS IT TO BE AN ECONOMIC BARGAIN

If, on first glance, The Bitless Bridle should seem expensive, consider for a moment the real economic and humanitarian costs of using a bitted bridle or any of the other bitless bridles on the market, all of which are pain-based.

- What price are you paying by using the bit method of communication, when **bits** cause over a hundred problems for you and your horse?¹.
- What is the price of **pain**? How much would you pay to free your horse from the pain of the bit and the legion of problems caused by pain?
- What is the price of safety? How much would you pay to increase your own safety and reduce the likelihood of costly accidents to yourself and your horse?
- What is the price of pleasure? How much would you pay to ensure that both you and your horse actually enjoy the exercise?
- What is the price of **poor performance**, slow progress or even stagnation with training, and a feeling of disappointment with yourself and your bitted horse?
- What is the price of a true **partnership** with your horse? How much would you pay to establish the harmony that is the hallmark of good horsemanship?
- What is the price of trying to cure problems without removing their cause?
 How much does it cost in time and patience, in training fees, veterinary fees, and sheer frustration, trying to cure problems that can only be cured by removing the bit?
- What is **the real price of a bitted bridle**? How much have you spent, or might you spend, in searching for the 'correct' bit for your horse's mouth?²
- How much does it cost you a week to keep your horse? Does it not make sense
 to spend less than this for a bridle of superior design that is compatible with the
 physiological needs of your horse and will serve you well for years?
- How much does it cost you personally, in fear and apprehension, riding a horse that is made nervous by the bit ... spooky, tense, and unpredictable?
- How much does it cost you to sell & replace a horse that 'fails to accept the bit'?
 Does it not make more sense to remove the bit and discover that you have a perfectly good horse already and one that is far better than you ever realized?
- Can you afford not to invest in The Bitless Bridle; the only major advance in communication between the human hand and the horse's head since the horse was first domesticated, six thousand years ago?
